

St Brigid

Although Brigid is named alongside St Patrick as a patron saint of Ireland, little fact is known concerning her life, if much folklore! She reputedly was born of humble stock near Dundalk c.450 and was baptised by St Patrick. She became a nun when aged about 18, then founded the first Irish convent at Cill-Dara (now known as Kildare). Later this became a double monastery and she was created the first abbess.

She was known for her compassion and generosity, her charity and liveliness/humour. The monastery became a centre of learning, noted for art and marvellously copied manuscripts.

She died there c.525. Her fame spread far beyond Ireland and the Celtic lands, for she is the patron saint of Sweden and is venerated in Portugal, Flanders and Alsace.



- ① Sit down with the children and show them the series of pictures overleaf. You may wish to lay the sheets out either on a table or the floor, and then read the story.
